Cambridge Library Program

The Cambridge Library is named after Paul A. Rode, Principal of Cambridge from 1973-1992. When Mr. Rode retired, the library was named in his honor for his dedication to Cambridge as well as his love of children's literature. Mr. Rode's memory continues to live on at Cambridge Elementary. There are many photos and newspaper articles in the library about Mr. Rode.

The Alamo Heights Library Program is based on the belief that students, parents, teachers, administrators and librarians are active partners in the teaching/learning process, connecting learners with information and ideas, promoting literacy and lifelong learning.

To this end, the library program works to insure that students are effective users of ideas and information. Our libraries provide a wide variety of materials that support and enhance the total educational program.

Services Provided for Students

- Sharing of fabulous materials in the library—books, journals, and online research resources. We have approximately 25,000 books from which to choose.
- Instruction on using the library automation system to make it work to the student's advantage.
- Copyright Instruction understanding the copyright guidelines and practicing how to properly use and cite copyrighted materials within projects.
- Lessons on how to best locate and use electronic reference resources- databases, encyclopedias, and more.
- Research/homework resources available on the Cambridge library web page—a one-stop shop for appropriate information and resources!
- Lessons on using the library efficiently—online card catalog, Dewey Decimal System, evaluating appropriateness of materials for assignments.
- Authors and Storytellers during the year.

Library Policies



- Students visit the library once a week with their homeroom. First graders check out one book each week. Second-Fifth graders check out two books each week. Students keep the books for one week. However, they can recheck out books if not finished reading them. An overdue or lost book will prohibit a student from checking out a new book. Please look at the date due slip in the back of the book.
- To help your child keep up with his/her books, please remind him/her to keep library books in backpacks when not reading the books. Library books should be your child's backpack <u>each</u> school day. "When I'm at school, my books are at school." Books should be in a plastic bag in the backpack.
- Students are allowed to come to the library during the school day on any day of the week (if approved by the homeroom teacher).
- Fourth and Fifth graders may check out one magazine each week (in place of one library book).
